ABOUT US

The Nelson Tasman Climate Forum brings together a wide network of dedicated volunteers, all committed to lowering Earth-warming emissions and finding ways of cooling our Planet. It's an open, welcoming community hub and non-partisan support network for anyone who cares about climate action.

The heart of our work is community connection: we advocate for strong climate leadership, help keep climate concerns front-of-mind locally, and nurture climate-action by supporting volunteer-led projects that reduce emissions, strengthen community and celebrate our connection to the natural world.



How do we make change? We act - We inspire - We engage with leadership

Our calendar is full of events and activities for community building and climate action in Nelson and Tasman. We believe a future with low emissions is one with strong communities, lots of walking and cycling, creativity, camaraderie and plenty of good times.

But more than that:

- 1. We contribute over 5,500 in volunteer hours toward local climate action
- 2. We organise a hugely popular annual Climate Action Festival, which runs over 10 days with more than 40 events

- 3. We run projects and activities such as monthly repair cafes, school programs, webinars, film and discussion evenings, and more.
- 4. We run regional campaigns, like "Take the Jump", based on the top seven actions individuals can take for the climate framed within simplicity, support and joy; as well as the "Swap One" campaign, encouraging people to swap one car commute for a bike, bus or walk at least once a week.
- 5. We write local and national submissions, speak to government committees and collaborate closely with our regional councils.

OUR IMPACT IN 2025

This year has once again been exceptional in many ways.

We celebrated the growing success and reach of our annual Climate Action Festival, built new momentum in reducing local transport emissions through the "Swap One" and "Travel Friendly" projects, expanded partnerships and fresh approaches to youth engagement via climate education and youth-focused events, and worked closely with our regional councils to shape ambitious, achievable emissions targets in local climate action plans.

At the same time, we strengthened cornerstone projects like "Take the Jump", coordinated a record number of thoughtful submissions to local and national government, kept waste out of landfill through our three thriving Repair Cafés, and hosted community events that helped keep people connected, hopeful, and engaged. Together, these efforts show that climate action in Nelson Tasman is not only possible, but vibrant, collaborative, and full of hope.

TAKE THEJUMP



AN ONGOING TAKE THE JUMP CAMPAIGN

The Jump is a climate action campaign that empowers people to try seven shifts that science says individuals can make to have the largest impact on reducing carbon emissions.

The campaign is bright, positive, and about community and inclusivity. It is a joyous, people-led movement, making real change possible.

- There are now a total of **100 trained ambassadors**. These include representatives from local Councils, businesses, community groups, education and the health service, half being locals, and half coming from other parts of the country.
- An active WhatsApp group for NZ ambassadors started in March 2024 and continues to grow.
- Social events are now self-organising a mutually supportive Ambassador community is a reality.
- Several outreach activities and connections: Repair Cafe, Enviroschools, Earthminds challenges, Positive Aging Expo, with 2 majors events: a Solstice Rhythm of the Earth celebration and a Sustainable Gift and Craft Christmas fair.
- 3 new rounds of Ambassador trainings, including one specifically for the national PSA Eco Group.

ENCOURAGING ACTIVE TRANSPORT

Transport accounts for 72% of Nelson's emissions, with daily congestion from school and work commutes contributing significantly.

For employees

The Swap One campaign is a collaborative initiative to reduce Nelson's greenhouse gas emissions by encouraging residents to replace at least one fossil-fueled journey per week with a sustainable alternative – walking, biking, bussing, carpooling, or working from home.

Developed by the Nelson Tasman Climate Forum, Mission Zero, Enviroschools, and Nelsust, the campaign includes initiatives like public events, business partnerships, a dedicated web portal, drop-in clinics, and an app for tracking progress.

Some Numbers:

- 216 sign ups (nearly at 1/4 of our goal of 1,000!)
- 26 employers/businesses on board
- 7 commute clinics done or planned
- 1 x low carbon commute breakfast event

Emissions saved so far: 2422kg of CO₂e

That's as much as 45 trees absorb in a year!

For students

Travel Friendly is working with schools to make active sustainable travel - like walking, biking, bussing, scooting, and carpooling - easier, safer, and more enjoyable for tamariki and whānau. In 2025, the programme gained strong momentum, with new Nelson schools actively engaged with the project, student-led action underway, and growing partnerships across the region.

Achieved this year:

- 3 Nelson schools on board, and others are in the process
- Tailored school frameworks and resources
- Community engagement and Student co-design
- Strengthened partnerships
- Safety & climate education for students.

YOUTH ENGAGEMENT

Connecting with young people on climate and the environment

This year the Forum began supporting Lighthouse Aotearoa and the regional climate change learning program run by Will Stovall. The mission of Lighthouse Aotearoa is to uplift environmentally conscious young people, providing them with representation to express their visions of a compassionate, sustainable future. The Forum's contribution includes collaboration on a number of events during the year and admin and financial support through Tasman Environmental Trust.

- In May, Lighthouse rangatahi presented to elected members on how the Nelson City Council Climate Change Strategy can best incorporate the needs and wellbeing of young people and future generations
- In June, Lighthouse hosted it's first Intergenerational Conversations event, which brought together 72 community members including youth, the Nelson Mayor, local councillors and staff, and community members of all ages.
- In September, fifteen young people from Lighthouse joined a similar sized group from Ōtautahi,
 Christchurch at Mistletoe Bay in the Marlborough Sounds for a 'Climate Futures Summit and Camp'.
- In October, Lighthouse hosted a screening of the youth climate action film 'Future Council'.
 Seventy-five people of all ages attended and four Lighthouse rangatahi answered questions and shared their voices with movie goers.

Repair Cafes allow members of the public to receive help with repairing used items, reducing waste to landfill and learning new skills together.

The Forum can now count three Repair Cafes in action, run by their members, as well as supporting volunteers.

Nelson and Motueka Repair Cafe are run monthly while the Mohua Repair Cafe runs once every 2 months.





EMISSIONS TARGETS AND POLICY

Supporting ambitious emissions targets in the new Nelson City Council Climate Change Strategy and demonstrating their achievability

A Forum group continues to work towards providing the rate of annual decrease in GHG emissions that is needed by our region to provide some probability of keeping us below 1.5 degrees of heating.

The group has worked in two phases this year:

- 1. Advocating for ambitious regional emissions reductions targets that matched the IPCC's estimation of what would be required to remain at a global temperature of no more than 1.5 degrees heating.
- => 8.3% each year for long-lived gases (carbon dioxide and nitrous oxide) and 1.5% each year for methane at the time of calculation. Those ambitious targets were successfully adopted by the Council in July 2025 but with some doubts expressed within the Council.
- 2. Demonstrating the achievability and affordability of those targets
- => Measures focus strongly on transport changes (responsible for 70% of Nelson's Ghg), with changes in industry and housing sectors as well.

The forum also held a well-attended Community Kōrero to reflect on navigating bicultural relationships in restoration work, with Hina Moses-Te Kani (Ngāti Kuia) and Ian Shapcott.

The Friends of Snowden's Bush, supported by members of the Forum's Nature and Climate Group, held their annual planting day with Brightwater School and Pinegrove Kindy but otherwise focused on maintaining the plantings from the past four years. Thanks to a successful quiz night and grants secured through Te Tauihu Environment Trust, the group is well-resourced for upcoming work, including plants already ordered for winter 2026.


